Bats & Halloween

Bats have long been associated with Halloween, but why is this? There are many different reasons why bats have become a Halloween symbol. Part of this is because bats are nocturnal, which means they are most active during night. This has led to some myths associating bats with death. However, bats have actually adapted to be nocturnal, partly as this helps them avoid predators.



Sometimes bats are also associated with vampires on Halloween. This has meant that over Halloween in particular, bats are portayed as terrifying blood-sucking fiends. However, as you'll find out later in this pack, all bat species in the UK feed only on insects, not blood. There are only three species of vampire bat in the world and these are found in South and Central America.

Despite this misconception of bats, they're actually very gentle, intelligent and captivating creatures!

Bats are unqiue and fascinating animals.

We need bats

Bats are an indicator species, meaning they tell us a lot about the health of our environment. Decreasing bat populations is a warning sign of wider problems within nature.

These amazing creatures are also important pollinators and pest controllers (because UK bats feed on insects).






Why fundraise for bats?

Bats are facing many threats

Bat populations have experienced severe declines historically due to loss of roosting sites, and lack of feeding grounds and flight paths caused by the destruction of their natural habitat. This is a direct result of human development; as we've increased the area we take up for our homes, shops, offices and roads, we have reduced the area available for bats to live.



However, our work is far from over and bats need more help now than ever. Bats are often portrayed as scary animals,

particularly around Halloween, and recently they have been wrongly blamed for the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are doing everything we can to secure the funds we need to make sure that we continue to be here to provide a national voice for bat conservation. We hope you can join us in our efforts.









MYTH BUSTERS





"Bats drink blood"

All 17 species of bat that we have in the UK feed solely on insects, not blood.

There are over 1400 bat species in the world and only three of these are Vampire bats.

The three vampire bat species
live in Central and South
America (not Transylvania!).
They feed on livestock, horses
and birds by making a small
nick on the skin and lapping
up a few drops of blood, the
animal barely notices and no
sucking is involved.

MYTH

"Bats are blind"

No, bats aren't blind (and so, they won't fly into your hair), but at night they use their ears rather than their eyes to make their way around. As they fly they, make shouting sounds. The returning echoes give the bats information about anything that is ahead of them, including the size and shape of an insect and which way it is going. This system of finding prey is called echolocation - locating things by their echoes. This is just one of the things that makes bats amazing and unique animals!



MYTH BUSTERS



"Bats have lots of babies"

The majority of bat species only have 1 baby (called a pup) each year. In the UK, pregnant female bats gather in maternity roosts to have their young. They will keep their pup very close and nurture them.





"Bats come out on Halloween"

Despite being associated with Halloween, bats are more likely to be hibernating at this time. Bats in the UK seek suitable hibernation sites and begin periods of torpor (deep sleep) in October.



Batty Celebration Ideas

This Halloween we're excited to be able to celebrate with our friends and families again.

However, some of us are still a little cautious and we all still need to be careful with social distancing.
